Google and Students, Perfect Together?

- When you quote or paraphrase an author's idea, you need to provide the author's last name and the number of the page you are quoting or paraphrasing. Put these in parentheses. Note that there is no comma between them.
- If you are using an electronic source with no page numbers, simply give the author's last name.
- If your source has no author listed, provide the article title (in quotes) and page (if available): ("Digital natives" 364)

## **Works Cited**

- Listed on a new page, heading is centered and not bold
- In alphabetical order by the last name of the author
- If the article has no author, alphabetize by the article's title
- First line of the citation is justified to the left margin, any lines after that are indented one half inch, referred to as a *hanging* indent
- Note that the retrieval date of the article is given, as well as where the article was found
- If the article was retrieved from a database, list the database and give the doi (digital object identifier)
- If the article was found on the web, give the website but do not include http://
